Recap: Chandra Jones provided a recap of our last meeting in October.

Reviewed Poverty Summit of November 13, 2008. Strengths: presentation of the NW poverty reduction efforts, morning presentations by Gov Granholm, Martin Luther King Jr, and others in the morning.. Advocacy speaker was excellent. Weaknesses: There was a lot of money spent on this meeting that could have been spent on services. The location was not prime—there were problems with parking, problems with the building including broken elevators and escalators. Region 8 planning was very confusing and some felt there was no action agenda developed. One planning group related to employment seemed to be an opportunity to complain about DHS and they could not focus on planning. Pam will distribute Region 8 plan as soon as it is received.

Summer Lunch Program Notes from presentation by Jerry Sedick.

OLHSA was requested by the City of Pontiac to operate the summer lunch programs in 2006, since they were no longer able. OLHSA built on the long established programs in Pontiac with established networks and expertise.

- o Program is federally funded, but operated through Dept of Ed in Michigan.
- o Free and reduced lunch eligibility required
- o Funding continues but it has been very difficult for the state to recruit sites, host organizations
- o Oakland County had a few specific sites (camps, etc) but very few open sites, although Gleaners is now open in Hazel Park
- o OLHSA is not able to take on other sites, but regularly get callers who need the service outside Pontiac. Program is expensive to run and OLHSA cannot afford the loss
- o Breakfast, lunch, and snacks are allowed but there is very low reimbursement for each
- o OLHSA only provided lunches for the whole City of Pontiac, so they benefited from economy of scale
- o Because Pontiac has 50% eligible, the whole city is eligible based on Free and Reduced lunch eligibility and no eligibility paperwork is required
- o Serves 0-26, over 18 only if disabled
- o Private sites must maintain paperwork files for eligibility.
- o State publishes lists of areas with high eligible populations

- Younger children can show up and get food, but parents cannot be fed.
- Food cannot be taken off site
- Any food service organization can bid for the service, but the reimbursement is less than \$3.00 for an approved lunch
- OLHSA advertises their sites in the Oakland Press, flyers sent home with students, PSA's, OCHD, and other agencies
- OLHSA interested in new Pontiac sites, especially need in NE. Each site must have 2 trained site supervisors and one must be there when the food is distributed.
- OLHSA has been serving 1100-1200/day
